MADETRA

Off the west coast of Africa, is a garden place. Madeira. The climate is wonderfully mild and equable, the normal temperature in winter being 61 F and in summer 75 to 85 F. Flowers grow in great profusion, bright colored bougainvilleas, honeysuckle, rhododenirons, azaleas, fuchsias, roses and lovely delicate camelias. More than by anything else, one is impressed by the lovely natural happy beauty of Madeira - perfume and birdss songs ever filling the air. After lunching at Reids Hotel, we drove far into the country and along the coast line as far as the roads permitted. We saw from a vantage point the Gabo Girao, 1960' high one of the highest sea cliffs in the world. Back in town, we had another ride in a bullock carroe, an easy and interesting way of going about. Curious customs, gentle happy people; bright sunshine, luxuriant nature, an altogether charming garden island to which one would be pleased to return.



MONAGO

A gray day; one looks so for the sapphire hues so. famous to the Mediterranean, that there is a little feeling of regret when the skies are gray. After riding up to La Eurbie, the ancient Roman town built by Agustus to mark the boundary between Italy and Gaul and on to Nice where we lunched at the Hotel Negresco, we pushed on to Grasse, going by way of the Gorges du Loup. Such scenery! We passed villages of the middle age, old hillside towns, but ever kept climbing upward. Finally we a came to a charming little place called Pont du Loup where we had tea. Oranges and lemons were growing there and far below one could see the silver stream and above, on the opposite mountain top, like a city in the clouds, Gourdon. How we could ever get there we could not imagine, but by going round many hairpin turns, crossing the ravines, coming nearer the snow-capped mountains, the Maratime Alps, and finally climbing above the timber line, we reached Gourdon. Such a view! A little village perched on top of a rock like an eagle's nest and no evident means of occupation or employment. We say not a cow or goat, and no grain or vegetables - how these people manage to exist is beyond me. Out of a male population of some 35, 28 were killed in the world war. After walking about the little village, we continued to Grasse, now ever going down grade. Such scenes. The Mediterranean stretching like a lovely fan beyond and the sunset-stained clouds sweeping in long lovely whisps across the sky. Never shall I forget these marvellous opportunities of witnessing the ingenious artistry of nature. At last we arrived at Grasse. It was dark, and the city was a pretty grouping of lights nestled along the hillside. After a little searching, we arrived at the perfume factory. Here they showed us how flowers were crushed, the flowers having been picked at three in the morning while the dew was still on the potals; they make no synthetic perfume at

Grasse, as they do at Paris. All perfume is made directly from flowers with the use of oils and gasoline going through various processes untill the essence is left, the gasoline clear, and soap is made from the oils. As it was getting very late, we hurried on to Cannes, where we had dinner and later visited the Casion. The trip back along the Mediterranean was beautiful. In spite of getting lost twice and being stopped for speeding, we finally arrived at Monaco, in time to board the tender for the "Franconia". A marvelous day - never to be forgotten - we had been in the south of France, in some ways gray, but with a beauty both rugged and mild.




